This presentation addresses the contributions of Latino/as in the Environmental Justice Movement. Prof. Figueroa argues that the history of Latino/a identity carries many of the critical features for this form of environmentalism, including notions of justice that best serve the struggles of people from the grassroots. He argues that the Latino/a contribution has provided valuable insights into concepts like environmental racism, discriminatory environmentalism, participatory justice and environmental identity.

Prof. Figueroa is Visiting Assistant Professor of Philosophy and Religion, and Environmental Studies, Colgate University, where he teaches environmental justice, environmental philosophy and a variety of interdisciplinary courses. Figueroa is co-editor (with Sandra Harding) of *Science and Other Cultures: Issues in the Philosophies of Science and Technology* (Routledge 2003) and has authored a number of articles and book chapters in environmental justice.
